Confessions

Confessions are typically heard before all Masses: 30 minutes before weekday Masses and as noted in the bulletin on Sundays.

Baptism

Baptisms are by appointment. At least one parent as well as the sponsor(s) must be practicing traditional Roman Catholics. For further information please phone Father for arrangements.

Confirmation

The Sacrament of Confirmation is administered every year by Bp. Mark Pivarunas, CMRI.

Holy Matrimony

If you are contemplating marriage, please make an appointment to speak with Father before setting a date.

Blessing of Expectant Mothers

2nd Sunday of the month immediately following Holy Mass.

Funerals

Simply call Father before calling the funeral director. Father will help you make all the necessary arrangements.

Last Rites and Sick Calls

Father serves a wide area and must often travel far to administer these sacraments. Please do not put off making arrangements until the last moment. Let us know if a church member is sick, hospitalized, or in danger of death.

Mass Intentions

Envelopes for Mass requests are available in the vestibule. Please request particular dates for Masses at least one month in advance.

First Holy Communion

First Holy Communions will typically be made once a year.

Blessing of Religious Articles

Every Sunday immediately following Holy Mass. Just come to the altar rail.

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Pope Pius XII on the Moral Obligation to Vote

Allocution to the Sacred College, Mar. 16, 1946

It is the right and at the same time the essential duty of the Church, to instruct the faithful in word and writing, from the pulpit or in the other customary forms, in regard to everything that concerns faith and morals or is irreconcilable with her own doctrine and therefore inadmissible for Catholics, be it a question of philosophical or religious systems, or of the ends intended by their fosterers, or of their moral conceptions concerning the life of either individuals or the community.

The exercise of the right to vote is an act of serious moral responsibility, at least when it is a question of electing those who are called to give the country its constitution and laws, particularly those concerning, for example, the sanctification of holydays of obligation, matrimony, the family, the school, and settlement according to justice and equity of the multifarious social conditions. It is therefore for the Church to explain to the faithful the moral duties which derive from the electoral right.

Address to the Delegates of the International Conference of Emigration, Oct. 17, 1951

It is a right and a duty to draw the attention of the faithful to the extraordinary importance of elections and the moral responsibility which rests on everyone who has the right to vote. Without any doubt, the Church intends to remain outside and above political parties, but how can she remain indifferent to the composition of a Parliament, when the Constitution gives it power to pass laws which so directly affect the highest religious interests and even the condition of life of the Church herself? Then there are also other arduous questions, above all the problems and economic struggles which closely touch the well-being of the people. In so far as they are of a temporal order (though in reality they also affect the moral order), Churchmen leave to others the care of pondering and treating technically with them for the common welfare of the nation. From all this it follows that: It is a strict duty for all who have the right, men or women, to take part in the elections. Whoever abstains, especially out of cowardice, commits a grave sin, a mortal fault.

Everyone has to vote according to the dictates of his own conscience. Now, it is evident that the voice of this conscience imposes upon every sincere Catholic the duty of giving his or her vote to those candidates, or those lists of candidates, who really offer sufficient assurances for safeguarding the rights of God and the souls of men, for the real good of individuals, families, and society, according to the law of God and moral Christian doctrine.

Toties Quoties Indulgence for All Souls' Day

Manual of Indulgences (1957), n. 590

The faithful, as often as they visit a church or public oratory, or even a semi-public oratory (if they may lawfully use the same), in order to pray for the dead on the day on which the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed is celebrated [November 2] or on the Sunday immediately following, may gain: A plenary indulgence applicable only to the souls detained in purgatory, on condition of confession and Communion, and the recitation six times during each visit of *Our Father*, *Hail Mary*, and *Glory Be* for the intentions of the Sovereign Pontiff [Church].

Today is **All Saints' Day**. There will be a **party for children** after the 10:00 am High Mass. Cookies and drinks will be provided.

Tomorrow is **All Souls' Day**. There will be two Masses at St. Therese's, back to back, beginning at 5:45 pm. Please see on the left the indulgences that can be gained on that day or the Sunday following (Nov. 8). Also: "The faithful who visit a cemetery during the period of eight days (Octave) from All Souls' Day (counting All Souls' Day itself) in a spirit of piety and devotion and pray, even mentally, for the dead may gain a plenary indulgence on the usual conditions, on each day of the Octave, applicable only to the dead" (*Manual of Indulgences* [1957], n. 592).

Tuesday, Nov. 3, is **Election Day**. Pope Pius XII's remarks on the obligation of voting can be found on the left. Holy Mass will be offered at St. Therese's at 6:30 pm, followed by Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, the recitation of the full Rosary (15 decades), and Benediction. We know how important this election will be for all of us. Please make an effort and sacrifice to come to pray for this intention. Conversion will not come upon our nation unless we're willing to make sacrifices, Our Lady of Fatima said.
